About IEMA

The primary responsibility of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA) is to better prepare the State of Illinois for natural, manmade or technological disasters, hazards, or acts of terrorism. Our goal is a "better prepared state."

IEMA coordinates the State's:

- Disaster Mitigation
- Preparedness
- Response
- Recovery
- State Emergency Response Commission
- 24-hour Communication Center
- State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC)
- Illinois Emergency Operations Plan



About IEMA

- IEMA is also responsible for protecting Illinois residents from the potentially harmful effects of ionizing radiation
- More than two dozen programs to protect citizens and the environment
- Training for local responders for accidents involving radiation
- Inspecting and regulating radioactive materials licensees
- Registering and inspecting radiation producing equipment and facilities statewide
- Accrediting medical radiation technologists
- Certifying mammography facilities
- IEMA also monitors 11 nuclear power reactors at six nuclear stations licensed to generate electricity in Illinois
- Inspects and escorts spent nuclear fuel shipments

IEMA National Qualification System Implementation

- Required Under EMPG FY2022
- For the purposes of these Implementation Objectives, “incident workforce” is defined as incident management, incident support, or emergency management personnel.
- Utilizing the NIMS Implementation Guideline and Tools



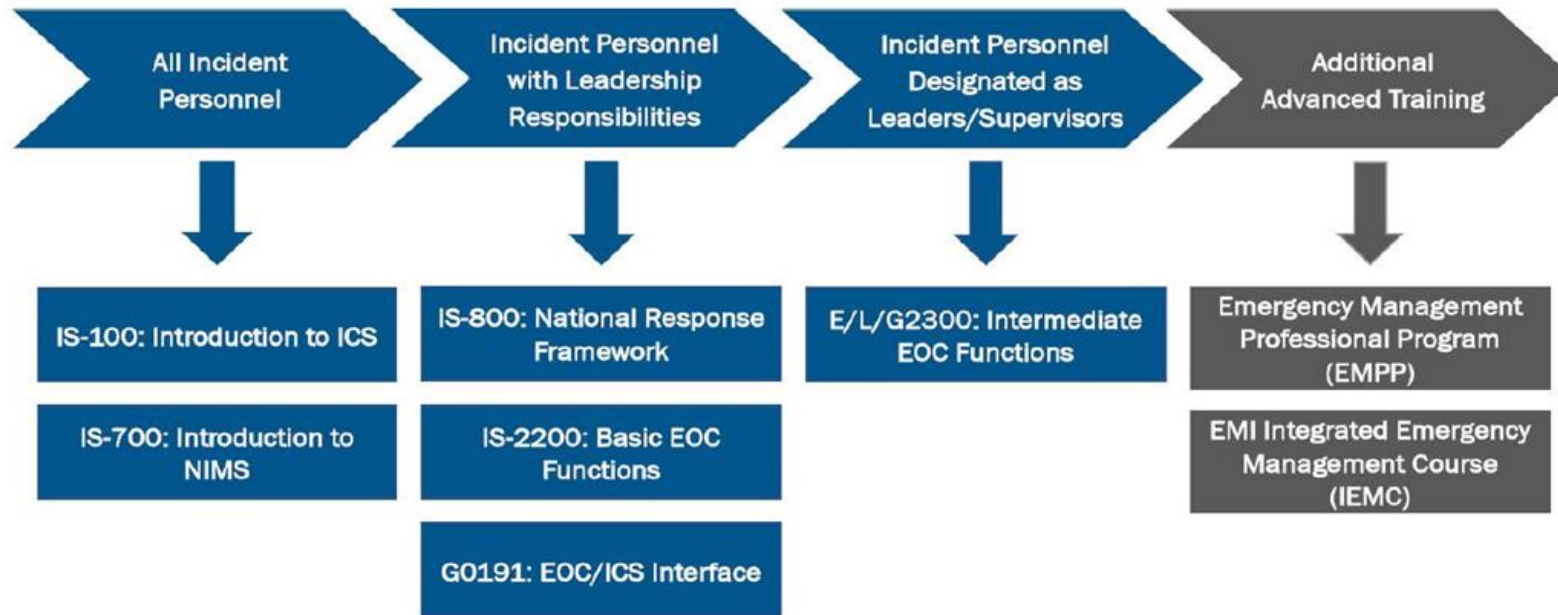
IEMA National Qualification System Implementation

- Phase I – FY22 (01OCT21-30SEP22)
 - Identify Incident Workforce
 - Incident Management
 - Incident Support
 - Emergency Management
 - Issue Position Task Books (PTB)
 - Identify training and criteria required
 - Procure/Develop system to track training and qualification of personnel
- Phase II – FY23 (01OCT22-30SEP23)
 - Develop qualification system procedures
 - Develop credentialing standards
- Phase III – FY24 (01OCT23-30SEP24)
 - Design, develop and conduct exercises in accordance with HSEEP for incident workforce personnel.



IEMA National Qualification System Implementation

- Personnel who staff an EOC follow the EOC training progression. Each Authority Having Jurisdiction (AHJ) determines how far individuals need to progress based on their role within the EOC and the size and complexity of incidents they will support.
